

Clara Bradley Baker Wheeler Burdette (1855 - 1954) was an American clubwoman and philanthropist, and a resident of Pasadena, California.

Clara Burdette was the first president of the California Federation of Women's Clubs when it was founded in 1900. She was also an officer of the General Federation of Women's Clubs from 1902 to 1904.

She was active in politics, including the 1932 presidential campaign of Herbert Hoover, and in Pasadena social life. She was a major backer of the Pasadena Maternity Hospital. She was a founder, second president, and life member of the Ebell Club, a women's social and philanthropic organization in Los Angeles. She was director of the Southwest Museum and the Pasadena Humane Society. After suffrage was gained, she was an organizer of the national League of Women Voters and the Women's Legislative Council of California.

During World War I, she was involved with flood conservation in California, and was California field secretary for the Council of National Defense. In 1926, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Syracuse University.
