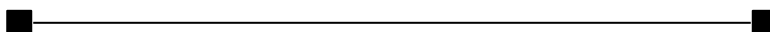

The 2026 Report on the Status of Women & Girls in California is out!

Each year, the California Commission on the Status of Women & Girls partners with Mount Saint Mary's University in publishing its report on the status of women & girls in our state and the issues and progress collectively made by the treatment, perception, opportunities, and lives of women in society.

This is a “can’t miss” event and the free report is packed with compelling “must know” information for anyone who cares about women, regardless of their gender.

While society may be slow to acknowledge “women” do not exist as interchangeable, “seen-one-you’ve-seen-them-all”, generic, “one-size-fits-all”, beings but rather as individuals where no two are completely alike, the 2026 Report on the Status of Women & Girls highlights the notions of intersectionality and its impact on the lives of women in California. Women have overtaken men in enrollment in graduate programs although both men and women are about equal in undergraduate programs. Even when working full-time, women still provide 50% more housework than their male partners. Interestingly, while women make up 2/3 of the unpartnered single heads of household as opposed to the 1/3 unpartnered male single heads of household, these women are far less likely to work outside the home than their male counterparts. More women of color work outside the home than white women, yet the earnings of women of color are more likely to be significantly damaged by time away from the workforce. While caretaking is the predominant reason women leave the workforce, the demand for caretaking is gender neutral since both men and women are equally likely to have family members in need of care. The need for caretakers is likely to increase as our workforce continues to age but society continues to ignore this fact, preferring to pretend it doesn’t exist, since it is essentially paid for by the harm inflicted on women’s earning power. Women are picking up a tab without being credited for the work we are essentially paying to perform through the wages we lose in providing care. Unlike action that has been historically taken with the development of infrastructure (such as highways and public transportation), insurance, or other solutions, when costs negatively impact men, the society continues to ignore the near universal social need for caretaking because women are disproportionately permanently harmed in paying these societal costs. Hopefully, in reading this report, you will see and discover the myriad of reasons you need to use your voice and speak out, if for no other reason than to provide your granddaughter with a better world than that into which you were born. Jane Cunningham Crowley understood the importance and power of women coming together to improve the world. Hopefully, this report will leave you eager for Federation!

Consider this....moments that mattered

That is often how meaningful change begins—not with great fanfare, but with one person willing to take the first step.

One person who keeps running.

One person who keeps serving.

One person who keeps believing tomorrow can be better than today.

In our communities, we witness these moments more often than we realize. Volunteers mentor young people, support families in need, advocate for important causes, and quietly give their time to make life better for others. They may never consider their efforts historic, but their actions matter. Each act of kindness, courage, and service helps shape the future in ways we may never fully see.

Consider this...

What simple action today might open a door for someone tomorrow?

What small moment in your life could someday matter more than you ever imagined?

History reminds us that lasting change often begins quietly with one person choosing action over hesitation and hope over doubt.

Perhaps the next moment that matters is already beginning somewhere around us.

Jane Elizabeth Lathrop Stanford (1828 – 1905) was a co-founder of Stanford University in 1885 (opened 1891) along with her husband, Leland Stanford, as a memorial to their only child, Leland Stanford Jr., who died in 1884 at the age of 15. After her husband's death in 1893, she funded and operated the university almost single-handedly until her unsolved murder by poisoning in 1905.

These amazing athletes will be playing baseball at an even higher level than that seen before 1954 when the last women's league was disbanded. Girls and women were not allowed to play true baseball until 1972 when the Supreme Court ruled that girls could play on Little League teams. It was not easy, but many girls prevailed. Title IX further benefited girls in all sports by requiring equal access and equal facilities in which to play.

The WPBL's inaugural season will run from August 1 through mid-September, 2026, and consist of 30 regular games, followed by playoffs. Season ticket holders will get first pick of the best seats. The entire first season will be played at Robin Roberts Stadium in Springfield, Illinois. It's a distance for California residents to travel, but for true baseball fans, that's just a plane ride away.

Each year on June 14, Americans pause to honor one of our nation's most recognized symbols - the Stars and Stripes. Flag Day commemorates the adoption of the first official American flag by the Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1777.

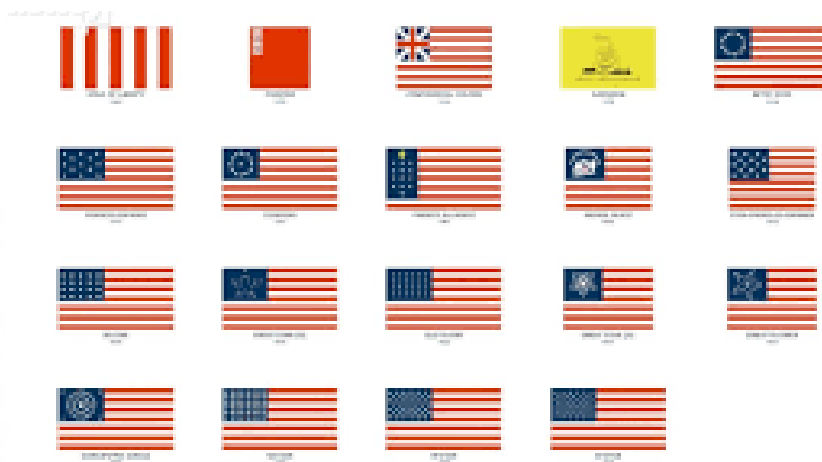
More than a piece of fabric, the American flag represents the ideals upon which our country was founded: liberty, unity, courage, sacrifice, and hope. Through times of war and peace, triumph and challenge, the flag has remained a powerful reminder of the resilience and spirit of the American people.

The movement to establish a special day honoring the flag began in the late nineteenth century. One of the strongest advocates was Wisconsin teacher Bernard J. Cigrand, who devoted much of his life to promoting national recognition of Flag Day. In 1916, Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation officially recognizing June 14 as Flag Day, and in 1949, Harry S. Truman signed an Act of Congress establishing National Flag Day.

Today, communities across the nation celebrate with patriotic programs, parades, educational events, and ceremonies honoring veterans and active military personnel. Schools and civic organizations often use the occasion to teach proper flag etiquette and reflect on the responsibilities of citizenship.

For clubwomen throughout California and across the nation, Flag Day offers an opportunity to reaffirm our commitment to service, community, and country. Whether displayed at homes, schools, veterans' halls, or community gatherings, the American flag continues to inspire pride and gratitude for the freedoms we enjoy.

As we observe Flag Day, may we remember not only the history of our nation's flag, but also the values it represents - unity, perseverance, and dedication to the common good.

GFWC INTERNATIONAL CLUBS

BEYOND THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES

The Mission Statement of the General Federation of Women's Clubs states that it is an "International Women's Organization".

An International Organization? Where are these International Clubs? What types of projects do they do? How do they differ from American clubs?

GFWC has had an international presence since the very beginning of our organization. Bombay Sorosis was founded in 1868 shortly before Jane Cunningham Croly founded the original Sorosis Women's Club in New York City. Despite skepticism and cultural barriers, the club was successfully formed, marking the beginning of GFWC's international outreach.

Today GFWC members span the globe in 15 different countries, making a difference in their communities. International Affiliates attend GFWC meetings, receive access to volunteer resources, and are eligible for leadership training provided by GFWC.

Currently, GFWC has International clubs in: Aruba, Austria, Bahamas, Belize, Brazil, Canada, Curacao, Cyprus, Korea, Netherlands Antilles, Peru, Philippines, Taiwan, Uganda, and Ukraine.

Over time, this global vision expanded significantly. By the 20th century, GFWC had clubs in dozens of countries, demonstrating the universal appeal of volunteerism and women's leadership. Today, GFWC International Affiliates exist in Aruba, Austria, Bahamas, Belize, Brazil, Canada, Curacao, Cyprus, Korea, Netherlands Antilles, Peru, Philippines, Taiwan, Uganda, and Ukraine.

International clubs outside the continental United States play a vital role in extending GFWC's mission worldwide. These clubs are comprised of women who live outside the U.S. but share the same commitment to community service. According to GFWC guidelines, international clubs and affiliates operate similarly to U.S. clubs but adapt their programs to meet the specific needs of their local communities.

The GFWC International Liaison Committee (consisting of a chairman and three committee members) helps maintain communications, provides resources and strengthens relationships between international and American clubs.

GFWC International Clubs outside the continental United States contribute significantly to their communities through a wide range of service projects. While each club operates independently, they all align with GFWC's core focus areas, including education, health, environment, civic engagement and the arts.

For example, in the Philippines, a GFWC affiliated club has developed a feeding program to combat childhood malnutrition for children three and under. In addition to providing daily meals for young children, the program educates parents on proper nutrition, demonstrating how local clubs address urgent community needs.

In Brazil, international club members have worked to improve the lives of children in underserved communities by offering educational support and leadership development programs. In Mexico, clubs mentor young women and provide scholarships to encourage higher education and personal growth.

GFWC International Clubs - Continued

International clubs in places like Taiwan and Cyprus focus on broader social issues, including women's health, environmental protection, and support for disadvantaged populations. These clubs often collaborate with local governments and nonprofit organizations, showing how GFWC's influence extends into policy and community development.

Founded in 1951, the Taipei International Women's Club (TIWC) is a multinational club, open to English Speaking women living in the Taipei area. They are dedicated to serving society and helping the needy. The club recently held a successful charity gala luncheon with the theme, "Kentucky Derby", chosen to celebrate the 2026 Year of the Horse. The event featured exquisite Kentucky Derby inspired cuisine and remarkable fashion, complete with Kentucky Derby stylish hats and line-dance lessons. The event raised one million Taiwan Dollars, equivalent to \$31,809.46 in U.S. Dollars.

Laura Connelly, GFWC Florida President-elect wrote an article, which recently appeared in GFWC Clubwoman Magazine, titled "Bountiful Belize" GFWC International Service.

In February 2026, GFWC Members from across the nation, including GFWC President Suellen Brazil and Laura Connelly, partnered with five GFWC Belize clubs for a week of hands-on service, education and international sisterhood.

They joined the GFWC Suga City Junioresettes to assemble period pouches filled with sanitary supplies that the Junioresettes will donate to a high school where girls currently must pay for these products. That evening, they partnered with the GFWC Suga City Sistaz to present a women's empowerment program for members and guests, many survivors of domestic violence.

The group worked with the Suga City Sistaz at a primary school supporting 42 special -needs students through targeted sensory and gross motor skill development activities and equipped teachers with practical trauma-informed strategies to apply in the classroom.

They joined the Belmopan Women's Club for a membership recruitment event and installed their new officers. The next morning, they reached more than 120 students with interactive lessons on healthy habits and nutrition.

In Belize City, the GFWC Belize City Junioresettes welcomed the group with a vibrant cultural showcase and members of the GFWC Belize Women's Club joined in for an interactive cooking class of cultural dishes. The time in Belize City closed by uniting both clubs in one of the most underserved neighborhoods to host a "Celebration of Women" event designed to uplift, connect and empower women. Plans are in the works for the next visit.

The Women's Club of Aruba, founded on September 17, 1934, is today at the forefront of the battle to help with the less fortunate, the elderly, the physically and mentally challenged, the environment, safety awareness, drugs and alcohol abuse, AIDS awareness and prevention programs, health and cancer awareness, and domestic violence.

GFWC International Clubs - Continued

For more than 76 years, The Student Awards Committee has recognized the best graduates of every level of education on the Island at the end of each school year. Their goal is to stimulate the best graduates to keep studying, to seek a professional career and to become community leaders of the future.

The "Medio Ambiente Goes to School" Project

The goal is to bring awareness to the school children that they have to keep their school clean of garbage, by using less packaging material for the food and drink they bring to school. Each year, every first grader is provided with a thermos for their drink, a plastic container for their sandwich, and a small towel. The children are taught about the importance of keeping Aruba clean.

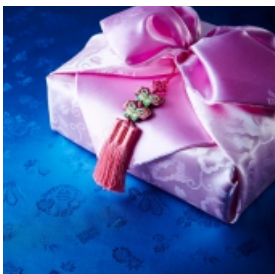
Signature Project 'DRESS A CHILD.' This annual project takes place during the first week of December. Between 200 and 275 underprivileged children in Aruba are provided with clothing for the holidays.

From South Korea's Instagram page:" Presenting gifts to elders in South Korea is a common way to "gamsahada"(wrap around) during Chuseok. Songpyeon, a steamed rice cake, and jeon, a Korean pancake filled with seafood and vegetables, make up the traditional meal during this harvest festival. Give thanks for the traditions that you and your family/friends share."

The Ukraine used to post on Facebook in English, however, their Facebook page is now only available in their native language, possibly an effect of the current war.

So many of the projects are similar to what our American clubs are doing to help others and to enhance our communities. Others are based on advancing education and preserving a country's culture while serving others. The uniting thread is that we are all joined in keeping with the GFWC Motto:

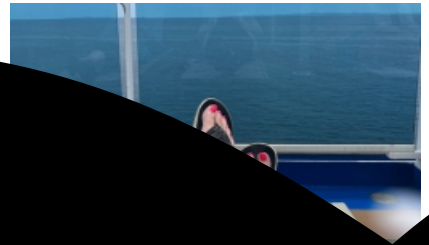

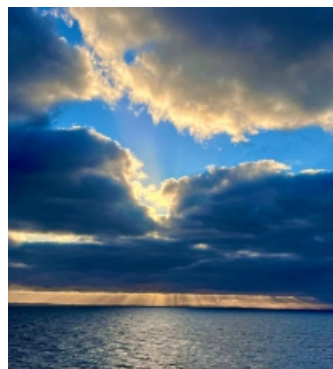
